Porter produced the world's first commercially successful film, The Great Train Robbery, in 1903. Other forms of moving pictures include filmstrips, helical scanning devices, and digital video, which can either be shown on a projection screen, broadcast on television, or stored in a digital medium such as a computer or video player. Film and video are collectively referred to as motion pictures, although the term "movie" is also used for certain kinds of film. Since the 1950s, television has been the dominant platform for showing films. The number of feature films shown in cinemas around the world in 2009 was the highest ever recorded, a total of 10,090,653 admissions. Worldwide, box-office revenues in 2008 reached approximately US\$11.1 billion, an increase of 8.5% over 2007.[2] In 2010, box-office revenues in North America reached approximately \$4.3 billion, a 9.5% increase over 2009.[3] Cinema has historically played an important role in the life of many people, both in theaters and at home.
