A barrister is someone who provides specialist legal advice and represents people and businesses in court, but there is a lot more involved in the role than what you see on your television and movie screens. Accomplished tax experts are able to advise in dealing with enquiries into a taxpayer's affairs by HMRC. A tax barrister can advise on tax enquiries, tax appeals and representation at tax hearings. Structuring gifts to avoid the reservation of benefit and pre-owned assets provisions is an area which you would need a tax barrister specialising in Private Client, IHT and Estate Planning. Those who do not want the tax system to work as it should are called tax abusers, although it should be said they come in two distinct varieties. The first lot are tax avoiders and the second lot are tax evaders. Any business recognises the benefits of freeing up time so that senior management are able to deal with important issues which will deliver sustainable commercial activity. Time spent dealing with the tax system is time away from running the business and this especially affects family-run businesses.



Some tax barristers have long-standing expertise in private client matters both onshore and offshore. Problem solving skills are of high importance to a tax barrister. A tax barrister is experienced in dealing with investigations, unexpected visits by authorities, challenges and disputes, as well as tax and criminal litigation. Judicial Reviews

Highly-regarded and experienced tax specialists advise on commercial disputes arising out of tax issues, including claims against professional advisers in relation to negligent tax advice and financial institutions involved in structured planning. There are some things that a barrister cannot do on your behalf and which you will have to do if you do not have a solicitor. This may include filing documents with the court and paying court fees. Skilful tax experts can advise on rights of instruction covering insolvency practitioners. A prospective barrister must complete a program of academic study and undergo vocational and professional training (pupillage) and must satisfy certain traditional requirements, such as attending a specified number of formal dinners at the respective inn. Some clients are unfamiliar with the litigation process and some professional clients may not have the resources to provide a tax litigation service to their client. A [Tax Barrister](#) service will represent clients to determine the best fit for their needs.

Much of the tax work of commercial barristers is on behalf of private clients, trustees and small-to-medium-sized businesses. Taxpayers spend billions of hours complying with income tax laws every year. Remuneration in the workplace is rarely straightforward and yet is high on the list of priorities of all concerned. A well-designed remuneration package is not just tax-efficient; it can motivate staff to achieve levels of performance that go far beyond the norm. Property investors are those taxpayers who buy property with the intention of making a long-term return via the letting of that property. Unlike property development, property investment does not carry with it the same favourable tax reliefs. A tax advisor's dealings with a company looking to merge with or acquire another company may vary from their professional relationship with an estate executor seeking to minimize estate taxes. Practising Barristers

Tax barristers specialise in courtroom advocacy, specialist legal advice, representing clients in court and through written advice. Unlike solicitors, who have a lot more direct access to their clients, barristers are rarely hired by clients. Solicitors will mostly instruct barristers on their clients behalf. Members of Chambers act for both individual and corporate respondents in regulatory proceedings brought by HMRC. Employment-related securities, share repurchases and venture capital trusts are additional areas that tax barristers may advise on. If you have a discrepancy with HMRC over how much tax you have paid, or they claim you owe, your tax barrister will be able to represent you at the First-tier Tax Tribunal or Upper Tribunal. Multi-disciplined tax barristers are experienced in advising banks, companies and funds on all types of finance arrangements and insolvency law. Advisory services such as [Inheritance Tax Advice](#) are a common sight today.

The need for highly experienced professional assistance where HMRC has alleged tax fraud cannot be overstated, given that criminal prosecution may follow if a materially false disclosure is found to have been made. A barrister that is experienced in tax matters advises and represents both HMRC and taxpayers in relation to indirect tax litigation. This includes appeals before the First-Tier Tribunal and the Upper Tribunal; judicial reviews; and other
